News from the Superintendent

Kindergarten Registration:

Kindergarten registration for the 2017-2018 school year will be held at the school on Friday, April 7th from 1:30 - 2:30 P.M. During registration, the incoming kindergarten students are invited to visit the current kindergarten classroom.

While their children are in class, parents will go to the library to pre-register the students for the fall session. At this time, registration and enrollment cards need to be completed. Information needed to complete these cards include: names and telephone numbers of the childøs doctor and dentist, phone numbers where the childøs parents can be reached during the day and a relative or neighbor whom the school should contact if unable to reach the parents.

To be eligible to attend kindergarten during the 2017-2018 school year, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2017. A certified copy of the childøs birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration.

Parents will also receive physical and dental examination forms. Kindergarten students will not be allowed to begin school in August unless these forms have been completed and returned to the school.

School fees will be paid during the regular school registration days on either August 7th or 10th. Pre-registration of new kindergarten students allows the school to organize the kindergarten class and transportation schedule.

Sports Physicals:

Newark Healthcare Center is graciously doing sports physicals again for Lisbon Grade School on Monday, April 10, 2017. A note about this was mentioned in the March newsletter stating the incorrect fee. They have changed the fee back to \$20 cash or check made payable to Newark Healthcare Center. They are also offering an incentive and plan to õgive backö to the school in some way. So if your student needs a sports physical for next year, this is a great way to free up an appointment for you plus help the school. All students participating in a school sport <u>must have a sports physical</u> before they participate with the exception of 6th grade that must have a complete school physical prior to participating.

Morning Drop off:

If you drop off your child in the morning <u>after 8:20 AM</u>, please come into the office and sign him/her in. It is very important that the teacher and the office have consistent information so that our records are accurate.

Absences:

If you know your child is going to be absent, please call the school office and leave a message on the recorder the night before or call the school by 9:00 AM the morning of the absence.

Hot Lunches:



If your child orders a hot lunch in the morning and then realizes later that they have a cold lunch, they will still be charged for a hot lunch. Unfortunately, once the food is prepared, it must be eaten or thrown away.

Recycle:

We want to encourage community members and parents to bring their old newspapers for the paper recycle bin and any clothing articles for the UsAgain clothing bin both on the south side of the building. These are both great ways to teach our students how to recycle and be environmentally smart.

Bus Notes:

The school requires that parents always write a note to the office or teacher if a student is to go home from school by a different method than normal. Often time@s children get mixed up on dates or where they are to go if a note is not sent. Our policy is to have students follow the normal routine unless they have a note or the school receives a phone call from the parents.

Medication:

All students who require medication at school (over-the-counter or prescription drugs) must have a physiciansøsigned approval and also a parentø signed consent. These forms are in your Lisbon Grade School Parent/Student Handbook or may be obtained in the school office. In addition, parents are responsible for labeling all non-prescription drugs with the studentø name, doctorø name and dosage. The medication should be kept in the nurseø office during school hours.

Graduation:

8th Grade Graduation will be held on Wednesday, May 24th at 7:00 P.M. Individual student pictures will be taken at 6:00 P.M. All 8th grade students must be here at 6:00 P.M.

Kindergarten Graduation:

Kindergarten Graduation will be held on Tuesday, May 23rd at 10:00 A.M.in the gym with the traditional kindergarten picnic to follow.


News from Coach McKinney

I do ask students to read at least two regular books or one chapter book a week and take the accompanying test(s). It has been a very busy March! Hopefully, we will be enjoying some nice, spring weather soon! In Reading, we are continuing to prepare for the PARCC testing which will be administered in April. We have also been working on daily journal prompts that have sparked great creativity in our class! I am very pleased with the effort in writing on these assignments! In Geography, we have been studying about Africa. The students have chosen a country and will be researching various facts to make a presentation for the class, similar to the format we used for the Europe projects. The students have been learning a lot about landforms, deserts, rivers and the names of the countries that make up Africa. Seventh Grade News


March really flew by! Everyone has more or less survived all the sicknesses going around.

After we conquer the PARCC exam, sixth grade will work on getting acquainted with using integers while seventh grade becomes more fluent solving algebraic equations. Eighth grade will have an added bonus of mastering quadratic equations. Remember that all LGS students can practice math on IXL.com wherever there is an internet connection. Take advantage of this great tool to help reinforce concepts learned in class.

Seventh grade science class has finished presenting their 3rd quarter projects. In the 4th quarter, we will focus on the systems of the human body, which includes the popular cow eyeball dissection. Eighth grade science class will be starting their final project on a physical science topic of their choice. All of the projects require using different applications, including Word, Excel, and Power Point software. Everyone will be using the classroom laptops to complete the projects.
