

March news from the Superintendent

Conferences:

Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held on Tuesday, March 20th from 3:30 - 7:00 PM and Thursday, March 22rd from 2:00 – 6:00 PM. Sign-up sheets will be sent home March 6th, and K-5th should be returned to the school no later than March 9th. Notices will be sent home by March 14th to confirm the time and date for each conference. <u>We encourage all parents to attend these conferences</u>.

Kindergarten Registration:

Kindergarten registration for the 2018-2019 school year will be held at the school on Friday, April 6th from 1:30 - 2:30 P.M. During registration, the incoming Kindergarten students are invited to visit the current Kindergarten classroom.

While their children are in class, parents will go to the library to pre-register the students for the fall session. At this time,

registration forms need to be completed. Information needed to complete these cards include: names and telephone numbers of the child's doctor and dentist, phone numbers where the child's parents can be reached during the day and a relative or neighbor whom the school should contact if unable to reach the parents.

To be eligible to attend Kindergarten during the 2018-2019 school year, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2018. A certified copy of the child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration.

Parents will also receive physical, dental and eye examination forms. Kindergarten students <u>will not be allowed to begin school in August</u> unless these forms have been completed and returned to the school.

School fees will be paid during the regular school registration days on either August 6th or 9th. Pre-registration of new Kindergarten students allows the school to organize the kindergarten class and transportation schedule.

Sports Physicals:

Newark Healthcare Center is graciously doing sports physicals again for Lisbon Grade School on Monday, April 23, 2018. All students participating in a school sport must have a sports physical before they participate with the exception of 6th grade that must have a complete school physical prior to participating.

PARCC Testing:

We will be giving your child state-required achievement tests on April 9th – 20th. The tests are a part of the PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College

and Careers) assessment program, and are being given to all eligible students in grades 3-8. The results of state tests will be reported to you on the School Report Card in the fall. We will review state test results along with other information to help us improve our school programs. In addition, you will receive information about your child's performance on the state tests he or she took.

You can help your child do his or her best on the test by:

- 1. Making sure, if possible, that your child attends school on the days of testing.
- 2. Making sure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before testing.
- 3. Providing breakfast on the mornings of testing.
- 4. Reminding your child to ask the teacher questions if he or she does not understand the test directions.
- 5. Letting your child know that you have confidence in his or her ability to do his or her best.
- 6. Advising your child not to worry about the test, just do the best he or she can.

Please call your child's teacher if you want additional information or have further questions about these tests. We look forward to sharing the PARCC results with you this fall.

Morning Drop off:

If you drop off your child in the morning <u>after 8:20 AM</u>, please come into the office and sign him/her in. It is very important that the teacher and the office have consistent information so that our records are accurate.

Medication:

All students who require medication at school (over-the-counter or prescription drugs) must have a physicians' signed approval and also a parent's signed consent. These forms are in your Lisbon Grade School Parent/Student Handbook or may be obtained in the school office. In addition, parents are responsible for labeling all non-prescription drugs with the student's name, doctor's name and dosage. The medication must be kept in the nurse's office during school hours.

Absences:

If you know your child is going to be absent, please call the school office and leave a message the night before or call the school by 9:00 A.M. the morning of the absence.

Hot Lunches:

If your child orders a hot lunch in the morning and then realizes later that they have a cold lunch, they will still be charged for a hot lunch. Unfortunately, once the food is prepared, it must be eaten or thrown away.

Recycle:

Bus Notes:

The school requires that parents always write a note to the office or teacher if a student is to go home from school by a different method than normal. Often time's children get mixed up on dates or where they are to go if a note is not sent. Our policy is to have students follow the normal routine unless they have a note or the school receives a phone call from the parents.

The snow day will be made up on May 30th. This will also be our Filed Day and 1:30 dismissal. May 29th will now be our Teacher Institute Day (No School). May 25th will be a full day of school.



In reading, all students have been working hard practicing strategies for the PARCC tests. We have been trying to do one practice every 2 weeks in addition to our weekly stories in our textbook. Seventh grade is now starting their Greek mythology unit. They made trading cards to represent different gods, goddesses, and creatures, and we have started reading several myths and will compare them to video versions throughout the unit. Eighth grade has worked on a folk tales unit and is finishing up a nonfiction unit that included articles on robotic legs. They will be starting World War II literature circles next. The second AR test for third quarter will be due on March 14th. Many students have been taking advantage of the extra credit given for reading more than two books in a quarter. Keep up the good work!

In English, the seventh and eighth graders recently finished units of poetry. We will be making class books of their best poems that will be on display during conferences. They are all improving on picking out important word choices in poems as well as identifying figures of speech. Seventh grade will be finishing up their sentence patterns in Shurley English before moving on to letter writing. The eighth graders will be starting World War II research on a topic of their choice. Most research and writing will be done in class. Their final paper will count as a grade for English as well as Social Studies. The sixth graders have learned some new rules on comma/parentheses/dash usage, reviewed how to make nouns plural and possessive, and wrote an argumentative narrative convincing an alien leader what customs/holidays to copy from Earth. They will be starting their poetry unit next.
