News from the District Administrator



Conferences:

Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held on Tuesday, March 19th from 3:30 - 7:00 PM and Thursday, March 21st from 2:00 – 6:00 PM. Sign-up sheets will be sent home March 4th, and K-5th should be returned to the school no later than March 8th. Notices will be sent home by March 13th to confirm the time and date for each conference. We encourage all parents to attend these conferences.

Kindergarten Registration:

Kindergarten registration for the 2019-2020 school year will be held at the school on Friday, April 12th from 1:30 - 2:30 P.M. During registration, the incoming Kindergarten students are invited to visit the current Kindergarten Classroom.



While their children are in class, parents will go to the library to pre-register the students for the fall session. At this time, registration forms need to be completed. Information needed to complete these cards include: names and telephone numbers of the child's doctor and dentist, phone numbers where the child's parents can be reached during the day and a relative or neighbor whom the school should contact if unable to reach the parents.

To be eligible to attend Kindergarten during the 2019-2020 school year, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2019. A certified copy of the child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration along with two proofs of residency.

Parents will also receive physical, dental and eye examination forms. Kindergarten students will not be allowed to begin school in August unless these forms have been completed and returned to the school.

School fees will be paid during the regular school registration days on either August 5th or 8th. Pre-registration of new Kindergarten students allows the school to organize the Kindergarten Class and transportation schedule.

Sports Physicals:

Newark Healthcare Center is graciously doing sports physicals again for Lisbon Grade School on Thursday, April 4, 2019 @ 1:00pm. All students participating in a school sport must have a sports physical before they participate with the exception of 6th grade that must have a complete school physical prior to participating.



IAR Testing (Formerly PARCC Testing):

We will be giving your child state-required achievement tests on April 12th – 18th. The tests are a part of the IAR (Illinois Assessment of Readiness) assessment program, and are being given to all eligible students in grades 3-8.



The results of state tests will be reported to you on the School Report Card in the fall. We will review state test results along with other information to help us improve our school programs. In addition, you will receive information about your child's performance on the state tests he or she took.

You can help your child do his or her best on the test by:

1. Making sure, if possible, that your child attends school on the days of testing.
2. Making sure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before testing.
3. Providing breakfast on the mornings of testing.
4. Reminding your child to ask the teacher questions if he or she does not understand the test directions.
5. Letting your child know that you have confidence in his or her ability to do his or her best.
6. Advising your child not to worry about the test, just do the best he or she can.

Please call your child's teacher if you want additional information or have further questions about these tests. Your child's teacher will be sending home more exact test dates/times for their grade level. We look forward to sharing the IAR results with you this fall.

Morning Drop off:

Students should not be at school in the morning prior to 8:10am. If you drop off your child in the morning after 8:20 AM, please come into the office and sign him/her in. It is very important that the teacher and the office have consistent information so that our records are accurate.

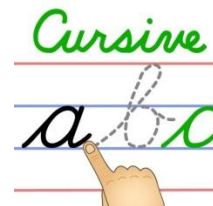

March News in the 5th Grade

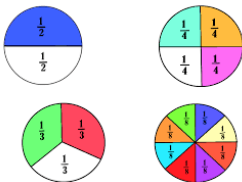

In reading, all students have been working hard practicing strategies for the IAR tests. We have been trying to do one practice every 2 weeks in addition to our weekly stories in our textbook. Seventh grade is now starting their Greek mythology unit. They made trading cards to represent different gods, goddesses, and creatures, and we have started reading several myths and will compare them to video versions throughout the unit. Eighth grade has worked on a folk tales unit and is finishing up a nonfiction unit that included articles on robotic legs. They will be starting World War II literature circles next. The second AR test for third quarter will be due on March 13th. Many students have been taking advantage of the extra credit given for reading more than two books in a quarter. Keep up the good work!

In English, the seventh and eighth graders recently finished units of poetry. We will be making class books of their best poems that will be on display during conferences. They are all improving on picking out important word choices in poems as well as identifying figures of speech. Seventh grade will be finishing up their sentence patterns in Shurley English before moving on to letter writing. The eighth graders will be starting World War II research on a topic of their choice. Most research and writing will be done in class. Their final paper will count as a grade for English as well as Social Studies. The sixth graders learned some new rules on comma/parentheses/dash usage, reviewed how to make nouns plural and possessive, and will be moving on to an



argumentative narrative convincing an alien leader what customs/holidays to copy from Earth. They will be starting their poetry unit after that.

If anyone is interested, the next *How to Train Your Dragon* movie just came out in theaters. I do have all the books in the series if anyone wants to try them out. They are funny and have a lot of cool action in them!

Math classes are reviewing for the assessment by working on a combination of new material and intense problem solving questions. Most students find these extra problems very challenging, so we will work together and share strategies for coming up with the right answers. When I think back to August, at the start of the school year, I cannot believe how far each class has come. Keep up the good work! I can't wait to see how much more we can learn before the end of the school year.

Seventh grade science class has an exciting project to complete in the March and April. Each student will start taking notes in Power Point over the next three chapters.
